

**Book Review Sparks Inquiries—****Field Committee's 'Alaska Community Inventory' Successful**

Few articles cause the Tundra Times as much trouble as the book review we ran July 7 on "Alaska Community Inventory," a listing of population and facilities in 231 Alaskan villages published by the Federal Field Committee. It was to successful. Agencies as far away as

Washington, D.C. wanted that book and it turned out we had the only available copy.

Shortly thereafter the Federal Field Committee subscription to the Tundra Times came back with the Post Office notation, "Out of Business." So they were, and no one seemed to know what they'd done with "Alaska Community Inventory."

As for the missing Field Committee, it died for lack of federal funding. At last report Sen. Mike Gravel was "rescuing the Alaska Field Committee from extinction at the hands of the Nixon Administration."

Gravel's office announced he had introduced an amendment authorizing \$500,000 over the next two years to continue the committee's work. The amendment is attached to a bill extending the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965

The Field Committee was established in 1964 to coordinate federal problems aimed at rejuvenating the Alaska economy following the Anchorage earthquake.

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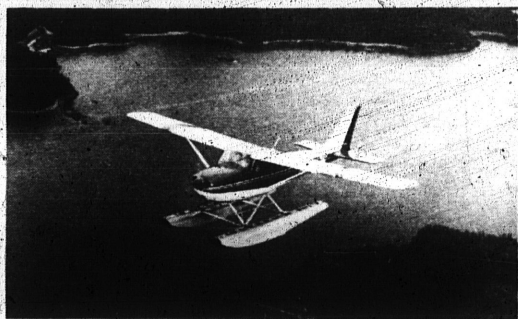
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
