Representative Howard Pol-
lock urged last week that steps
be taken to establish educational
television systems in Alaska.

In a letter to Governor Keith
Miller Pollock said, "We have
perhaps the greatest testing
ground in the world for pilot
programs and we should be ac-
tively pursuing every conceivable
possibility."

"We are missing an excellent
opportunity, and indeed we are
derelict if actions are not taken
very soon to file the four sepa-
rate applications for the educa-
tional channels in Anchorage,
Fairbanks, Juneau, and Ketchi-
kan," Pollock said.

The Alaska Congressman urged
that a separate "quasi-public
educational and public broad-
casting authority" be established
for educational television.

Pollock also advocated the
use of satellites in the ETV
system in order to include re-
mote Alaskan villages in the
program.

"We have such an enormous
potential in regard to the appli-

cation of satellites to education
in Alaska, and the state of the
art is such that the satellites can
produce a relatively high T.V.
and radio signal for remote
school house terminals, so that
the future capabilities for in-
structional and educational pur-
poses really stagger the imagina-
tion," stated Pollock.

"We need to develop plans
for in-service training of teachers
and develop program planning
with teachers to earn extra cred-
its in meeting certification re-
quirements for education via
satellite, an exciting and new
broad aspect of educational in-
struction for the future of Alas-
ka," Pollock added.

"I am firmly convinced that
a dedicated communications sat-
ellite is possible for Alaska if we
put forth all of the energy and
resources at our commands to
gain the inter-agency coopera-
tion of all phases of the federal
and state government and the
private sector," Pollock conclud-
ed.
