## Suspect Sought for Anchorage Murder

Alaska State Trooper Criminal Investigation Bureau personnel have interviewed persons who have stated that Celia Beth Van Zanten was in the Tiki Room Bar on Spenard Road on December 23, 1971 at approximately 1:00 a.m.

Miss Van Zanten was in the

company of a white maje adult, believed to be in his early twenties, approximately 6 feet tall, 155 lbs. slender build with mo-derately long dark brown hair, loosely hung.

### BLM Installs Anti Ice Fog Experiment

An experimental anti pollution system installed in Fairbanks may help solve the pro-

banks may neip soive the pro-blem of ice fog in the Arctic.
This system, designed and in-stalled under the direction of Bureau of Land Management engineer William C. Stringer, was created to prevent the formation of ice fog by flue (exhaust) gases in arctic areas, but, as a byproduct, may also prevent contamination of the atmosphere.

Effectiveness of the unit will be monitored in a year-long study directed by Professor A. Ronald McKay of the Institute of Arctic Environment of the

the University of Alaska.

The intent of the gevice is The intent of the device is to cool flue gases with outside air to a point where exhaust condensation is eliminated or reduced to an acceptable level. Condensation of moisture in the Condensation of moisture in the the flue gas will remove other pollutants that are solvable in water.

ted by ice fog and air pollution because temperature inversions during cold spells in fairbanks are among the strongest and most persistent in the world.

Low-lying air over Fairbanks stagnates and becomes decoupled from the atmosphere above, permitting high concentrations of all pollutants in addition to the presence of the ice fog itself. The anti-pollution heat exchanger device, installed at the

BLM heating plant in Fairbanks, utilizes boilers which consume between 22 and 44 gallons of No. 2 diesel fuel-per hour.

Principles evolved from the experiment will be applicable to units now emitting the same type and class of ice fog and

type and class of ice fog and atmospheric pollution. The anti-pollution heat exchanger device was manufactured by the O and M Manufacturing Company at its Houston, Texas, plant from specifications developed by Stringer.

After shipment from Houstion to Fairbanks, the equipment was installed under the direction

was installed under the direction of Stringer and personnel from the BLM Fairbanks District Of-

fice and the University of Alaska.
Professor McKay will provide instrumentation, collect data, monitor results of the installation, compile results and make recommendations to BLM as to the efficiency of the design and possible modifications. Emphasis of his studies will be on moisture emitted from the stack.

He will also be testing for the elimination of carbon mo-noxide, sulphur dioxide and other atmospheric pollutants.

Photographic techniques will

be employed whenever possible to record ice fog behavior.

McKay will have the assistance of several gradyate students provided for in a contract entered into between the Department of the Interior and the University of Alaska for this research project.

Autopsy, reports have indi-cated that death was due to exposure and that evidence of

criminal assault was present.

The Criminal Investigation

Bureau is requesting the aid of the public in locating the last person seen with the Van Zanten girl. A composite picture is attached.

Anyone who may have seen this individual in the Tiki Room, in the back lot of the Tiki Room, or in any other place with or without the Van Zanten girl is requested to please con-tact Criminal Investigation Bureau of the Alaska State Troopers at their earliest convenience.
