Study of Sea Ice Organisms

FAIRBANKS - The University of Alaska's Institute of Marine Science has received a grant from the National Science Foundation for continued support of a project studying ecology and metabolism of sea ice organisms.

The project, now in its second year, is directed by Dr. Rita Horner and Dr. Vera Alex-

Rita Horner and Dr. Vera Alexander. The grant, in the amount of \$7,800, brings total NSF support to \$48,000.

Dr. Alexander explained the project is studying the algae population that grows in sea ice near the shore of the Arctic Ocean.

She explained a thin layer of

She explained a thin layer of algae grows in the bottom two centimeters of ice. "We have devised a new way of looking at its metabolism and rate of photosynthesis," she said, "using divers to study the organisms where they grow."

Research is being conducted near the Naval Arctic Research Laboratory at Barrow, on the north coast of Álaska.

Chief diver Robert Clasby will continue gathering data

will continue gathering data throughout the winter, in diving stints of 20 minutes or less. Duration must be limited because of cold temperatures.

Anch. Contractor Found Guilty

An Anchorage-based contrac-An Anchorage-based contractor who failed to eliminate a draining lake of sewage from a Juneau trailer court has been found guilty of a criminal violation of the State's environmental protection laws, Attorney General John E. Havelock said,

Havelock said that Dave Stock, president of Stock and Grove, Inc., was convicted late Friday of polluting Duck Creek in the Mendenhall Valley.

The district court jury verdict, returned after a two-day trial, marks the State's first successful criminal prosecution under its environmental statutes,

he said.
The criminal charge against Stock was filed on August 8, "after it became clear that more than half a year of negotiations had produced no result," Have-lock said.

Stock, who is scheduled to

be sentenced, faces a maximum possible sentence of \$25,000 fine and a year in jail.
