John Hendrickson, counsel for the village of Unalakleet, claims 750 hours plus out of counsel pocket expenses of \$5,000.

Art Lazarus and Northwest Alaska Native Association lawyers Wilkenson, Cragon, and Barker claim 675 hours work and plus out of pocket expenses of \$5500.

Attorneys Ely, Guess, Rodd, and Madsen have claimed no fee.
Total estimated hours claimed hours clai

med by attorneys is 40,000. Estimated out of pocket expenses amount to \$200,000.

Depending on which provision is adopted by the House-Senate Conference on the Alaska Native land claims bill, attorneys could be compensated at a rate between \$20.90 and \$62.50
