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

In an easier event, the Ft. Yukon Dancers performed to the oldtime fiddling of William Stevens, Ft. Yukon, and guitar player, Vincent Yaska, from Koyukuk. "This is the first time any Athabascan fiddlers have played at the Olympics," said Johnny Alexander, the director of the Ft. Yukon Dancers.

And what a crowd pleaser those Ft. Yukon Dancers were! The audience clapped their hands in time with the music and when master of ceremonies Al Grant got out on the floor to dance a jig, he got a standing ovation.

"We're going to have an Ath abascan Oldtime Fiddling Festival November 10 and 11 at the Eagles Hall in Fairbanks," said William Stevens, "We didn't have time for the audience to join in the jig here but we will at the Eagles Hall

Even though the Ft. Yukon Dancers were a hit, the Arctic Village Dancers won the Athabascan dance portion of the Olympics. "Their costumes are beautiful," said Johnny Alexander. "And their dance routines are good too." But you could see that he plans to rehearse his dancers more before next year's Olympics.

Several of the participants in this year's Olympics were annoyed by how late the events ran. Most of them had been awake since 7 or 8 a.m. in order to be in the daily preliminary events which began at 9 a.m.

Even with these preliminary events the finals ran to long past midnight. Yet, the Olympics judges have cut down the time for each event by, for instance, limiting contestant to three minutes per try during the high kick. Events do move along but there are just so many of them.

"Maybe next year we could start the evening events earlier," suggested Carol Pickett "I was so tired by 3:30 Sunday morning that I didn't do as well as I think I could have in the one-foot high kick."

Nevertheless, Pickett, Lady Laraux and other women contestants will return next year as they advance into the competition.

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
