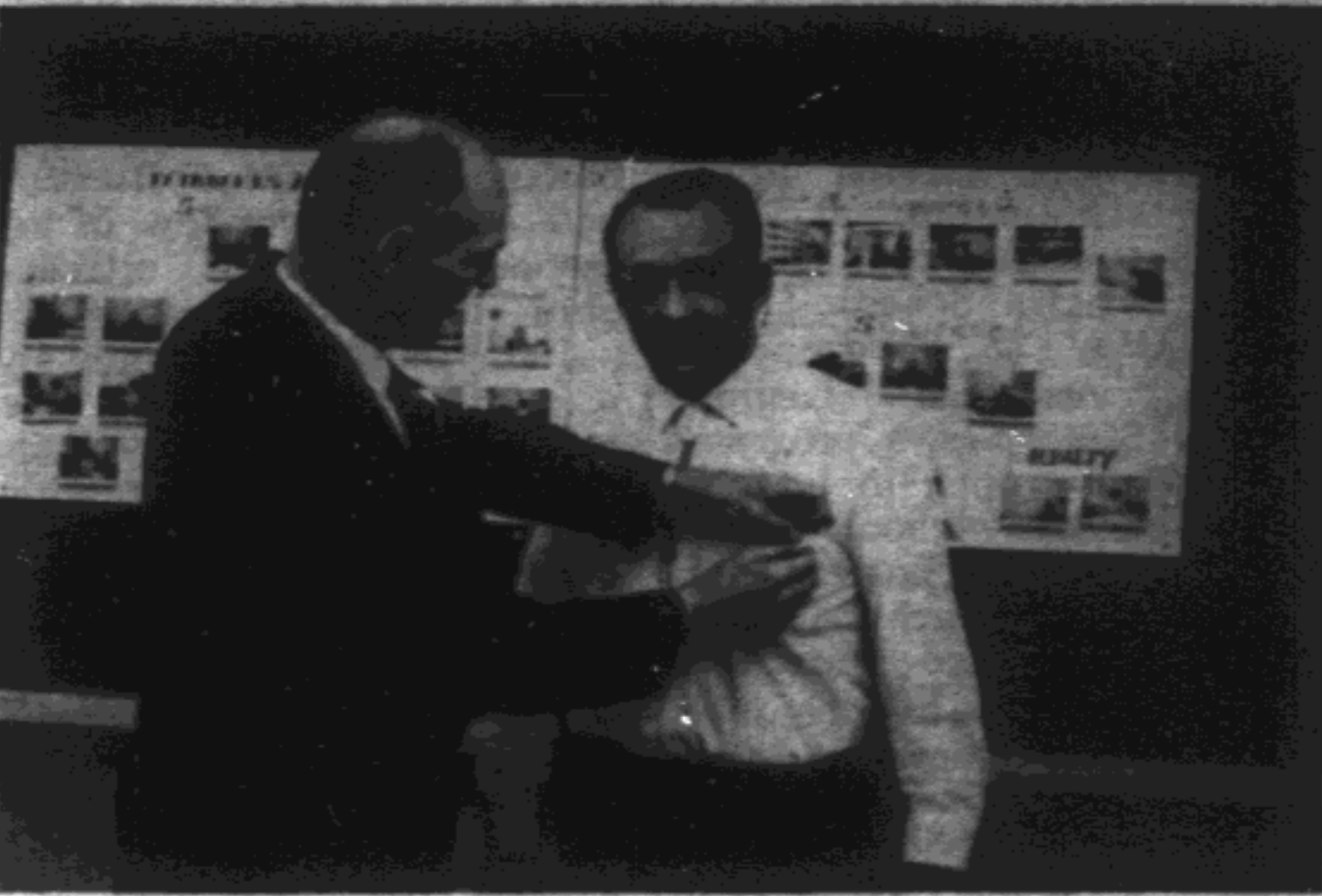


BLA Honors Peterson

State of Alaska Leads Nation In Export of Fishery Products

WASHINGTON—Alaska led the nation in the export of fishery products in 1966 and ranked fourth among the states in the export of paper and allied products according to a Department of Commerce report delivered to Sen. E. L. Bartlett.

In 1966, the last year covered by the Bureau of International Commerce Report, Alaska shipped an estimated \$42 million of manufactured goods to foreign markets. Fishery exports total estimated \$27 million. Since 1960 the report said, sales by Alaska to foreign markets climbed by 86 per cent. Exports on a per capita basis were \$153, sixth highest among the states.

Exports of paper and allied products from Alaska nearly doubled their 1960 value. Export sales totaled \$9.2 million, accounting for 6.5 per cent of the national paper and related products

export.

Fish product sales abroad accounted for almost a third of the nation's export sales.

Fish product exports show a six-year increase of 90 per cent, nearly all since 1963.

Foreign sales of salmon, \$22.2 million in 1966, accounted for 90 per cent of U.S. export of this product, the report said.

The export of seal furskins in 1966 were valued at \$4.1 million. Alaska is the only state exporting seal furskins.

Sealed bids in single copy for furnishing all labor, equipment and materials and performing all work on Project F-095-10(2) and F-095-10(3), Haines-Lutak Road, Ferry Terminal Paving and Haines-Canadian Border Safety Project, described herein, will be received until 11:00 a.m. prevailing time, June 11, 1968, in the Commissioner's Office, Department of Highways, Island Center Building, Douglas, Alaska.

This project consists of grading, drainage and hot bituminous pavement on 4.3 miles of the Haines-Lutak Road. Included in this Project will be the paving of the Haines Ferry Terminal and installation of guard rail at various locations between Haines and the Canadian Border.

Principal items of work consist of the following: excavation; 8,200 tons of crushed aggregate base; 6,300 tons of hot bituminous pavement; 1,600 linear feet of 8" perforated pipe; 12,000 linear feet of beam type guard rail; and miscellaneous items of work including utility adjustments. All work shall be completed by November 15, 1968.

Sealed bids in single copy for furnishing all labor, equipment, and materials and performing all work on Project S-SG-0539, "C" Street Extension, Sand Lake Road to Northern Lights Boulevard, described here, will be received until 2:00 p.m. prevailing time, June 13, 1968, in the Commissioner's Office, Department of Highways, Island Center Building, Douglas, Alaska.

This project consists of grading, drainage, and hot bituminous pavement on 3.5 miles of roadway, and construction of a composite steel and concrete bridge across Campbell Creek. The project is located adjacent to the City of Anchorage, Alaska.

Principal items of work consist of the following: 57,300 cubic yards of common excavation; 199,000 cubic yards of muck excavation; 663,600 tons of selected material; 24,200 tons of crushed aggregate base; 32,000 tons of subbase material; 5,800 tons of hot bituminous pavement; 2,00 linear feet of 18" reinforced concrete pipe; 29,350 linear feet of 6' chain link fence; 5,200 linear feet of curb and gutter; approximately 122 cubic yards of class A concrete; 24,300 pounds of reinforcing steel and 52,000 pounds of structural steel; and miscellaneous items of work.

All work shall be completed by October 1, 1969.
