This project will consist of grading and drainage of 5.2 miles of roadway, and surfacing alternatives of bituminous surface treatment and surry seal. The project is located approximately 43 miles southerly of Fairbanks, Alaska.

Principal items of work consist of the following: 17,500 cubic yards of Borrow; 11,000 tons of Crushed Aggregate Base; 306 linear feet of 24" Pipe Conduit; Surfacing Alternative "A" consists of 55 tons of MC-30, 173 tons of RC-800, and 1,873 tons of Cover Aggregates; Alternative "B" consists of 158 tons of QS-1 Emulsion and 1,700 tons of Aggregate, camp facilities shall be furnished by the Contractor to approximately 8 State employees; and miscellaneous items of work.

Command Rescues Lime Villagers

Members of the Alaskan Air Command's 5040th Helicopter Squadron flew to the rescue of the flood-stricken fishing village of Lime last week with food supplies for residents and their dogs.

The village cache of 4,000\ dried fish had gone out with the high water and most of the men of the village were stranded downstream when they attempted to bring in supplies by boat.

After unloading food for the people, the helicopter crew flew food to starving sled dogs stranded across the swollen river.

"Two of the animals had already died," Major Richard C. Grounds, aircraft commander reported. "Those still alive were in pretty bad shape."

He also noted that although the villagers were down pretty much to flour and sugar, they did manage to welcome the aircrew with coffee.

Villagers live primarily off the land, fishing in the summer and hunting through the winter. Once or twice a year they travel down river to purchase staples and clothing.

No word has been received as to their plans for recouping flood losses.

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
