Marketing and joint ventures will be among the topics discussed by representatives from Russia, Greenland, Canada, and Alaska.

Inuit are prohibited from wearing clothing made from marine mammals when they cross certain borders and from transporting ivory, even as gifts. These barriers will be addressed. MacLean's goals are a 'circumpolar

free trade zone and visafree travel throughout the Inuit world.'

and ICC. Alaska Gov.
Walter Hickel recently

Oil spill symposium set

Almost four years ago, March 24, 1989 the supertanker Exxon Valdez can aground on Bligh Reef in Prince William Sound spilling 11 million gallons of Prudhoe Bay crude oil

The shorelines of the sound, the Kenal and Alaska Peninsulus, Kodink luland and Cook laket were oiled.

To assess damage and plan for restorption, the Eccost Valder Oil Spill Trustee Council was formed.

The results of the council's studies will be presented to the public in the Oil Spill Symposium, Feb. 2-5 at the Egan Convention Center in Anchorage. Most of the studies were kept confidential because of law suits.
