horse March 6th to 11th.

Killbear's team will be demonstrating native sports and will take part in informal competitions with a team from Inuvik headed by Edward Lennie.

Lois Keating, Special Events Co-ordinator for the Winter Games, spoke with Killbear last week and was told his team members were coming from Pt. Barrow, St. Marys, King Island and possibly from Kotzebue.

Billy Killbear is well known throughout Alaska for his prowess at the International Eskimo Olympics, held every summer in Fairbanks. He was also involved with the First Northern Games held in Inuvik in 1970.
