ORDINANCE NO. #15,01.001

1. All persons are forbidden to conduct, operate, or establish any tavern, bar, or roadhouse serving alchalic beverages, or package liquor store, within the area of tribal jurisdiction.

2. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed as infringing the right of incorporated cities, within the orea of tribal jurisdiction, to exercise selfdetermination in the establishment of such promises within the corporate limits, in accordance with, and as prescribed by, law. 3. Any person violating the above tribal ordinance, shall be liable to prosecution under Federal Law and/or State Law.

Done this 4th day of October 1967, at Barrow, Alaska, by unanimous consent and vote of the undersigned members of the Board, said members constituting a majority of the Board of Directors of the Arctic Slope Native Associa-
