

Stefansson Lamp Burns Continually At Native Exhibit

A seal oil lamp reportedly owned by Vilhjamur Stefansson, Arctic explorer, has been lighted every day at the Native Cultural Exhibit in Anchorage.

Lamplighter is Floyd Ahukana, 77, of Barrow, who personally knew Stefansson. The lamp is housed in a sod igloo built by Ahukana. It will burn every day of the centennial year.

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Boycott Hurting Seal Skin Business

The price of raw seal skins could drop as much as \$22, Perry Green predicted this week.

Green, an Anchorage furrier, said a European boycott of seal coats has closed down a major market for Alaskan furs. On his annual selling trip through Germany, Switzerland, France, Holland and England, he was not able to sell a single skin.

"Some wealthy woman in Germany started a campaign," Green explained. "She heard that seal pups were stunned and skinned without being killed. Now everytime a European furrier shows seal

skins in his window, he gets picketed."

Green predicted the price of seal coats could drop in Alaska because of the large stock on hand.

He reported that good raw skins that cost \$30 at the beginning of the season are now going for as low as \$8. Skins that brought hunters \$15, are down to \$4.

"The North Atlantic hunters from Norway carry out that cruel way of killing pups. Alaskans have to suffer for it," Green said.

permission to come along. "One reason for coming was to find my real mother," Dennis said. "I remembered her name, Katherine Nikita, but I had no idea where she was."

In Anchorage, Dennis met Albert Yakasoff on the Cook Inlet Native Association. Yakasoff knew the mother, now remarried and living in Eklutna. He took Dennis to her home, without advance warning.

Apparently none was needed. "It was a real special feeling to meet my mother," Dennis said. He reported a bit of awkwardness at first, but that soon disappeared. "We talked for several hours,"

he said. "I started to wonder what things in life really are important. My mother's house has no electricity. She cooks on a tiny Coleman stove. But she's happy. She's had a good life."

Dennis planned to attend college in California this fall, but now he is thinking of going to the University of Alaska. He wants to be a social worker.

"I've been asked to go back with the tribe," he said. "They say they need people like me. I'm thinking about it. I might do it if I don't have to give up my adopted parents. They are real wonderful people. You owe a lot to people who rear you."

Dennis will remain with the craft show at the Kaloo building in Anchorage until September.
