COMMERCIAL FISHERIES REGULATORY PROPOSALS June 20, 1969

To be considered for adoption by the Department of Fish and Game at a meeting at Juneau, Alaska, starting on July 29, 1969.

Attached for your information are proposed regulations for COMMER-CIAL FISHERIES. These proposed regulations will be considered for final adoption, amendment, or repeal by the Department of Fish and Game at public proceedings in the auditorium of the Department of Fish and Game, Subport Building, Juneau, starting at 9 a.m. on July 29, 1969.

Pursuant to the Administrative Procedure Act, public comment is invited on these proposed regulations. Comments must be submitted to the Department of Fish and Game in writing as there will not be an oral, public hearing at the July 29, 1969 meeting. Written comments should refer to the specific proposal and must be received by the Department of Fish and Game on or before July 24, 1969. NOTICE OF PROPOSED CHANGES IN THE REGULATIONS OF THE ALASKA DEPARTMENT OF

FISH & GAME Notice is hereby given that the Alaska Department of Fish and Game. under authority vested by AS 16.05.690 proposes to adopt regulations in Title 5 of the Alaska Administrative Code as

follows: REPORTS REQUIRED OF PROCES-SORS, BUYERS AND FISHERMEN. (a) Each person, company, firm or organization who purchases unprocessed fish, or processes fish or by-products of fish must:

1. Furnish to the Department each calendar year before operating a written statement of intent to operate with a description of the nature, extent, and location of the operation on forms available from the Department.

2. Submit, no later than January 31, an accurate and complete summary of the previous year's operation on statistical forms available from the Department.

A. Reports not submitted for 1967 and 1968 or either one of these years must be submitted by September 1, 1969.

3. Furnish, verbally or in writing, purchasing or processing records as requested by the Department or its representative.

(b) Each buyer of fish or shellfish shall keep a record of each purchase on fish tickets or other forms supplied by the Department of Fish and Game. Fish tickets shall be submitted to the local department representative at least once a week or as otherwise specified by the Department for each particular area and fishery. The record shall include the following:

1. The name of the company or individual buying the fish.

2. The name of the fisherman from whom the fish were purchased.

3. The name of Coast Guard number of the vessel employed in taking the fish.

4. The date of landing of the fish. 5. The Department registration number, whichever is applicable.

6. The type of gear by which the the fish were taken.

7. The nearest headland or bay or statistical catch area in which the fish

Department may require. (c) Each fisherman shall furnish to

the buyer factual catch data necessary for completion of reports required by by the Department. (d) Each shellfish fisherman shall

furnish in writing to the Department directly or through the buyer, data necessary for reports required by the Department. (e) The following information re-

garding the transporting of unprocessed fish shall be transmitted to an authorized representative of the Department either verbally, in writing or by telephone:

1. The number and species of salmon taken in any regulatory area shall be reported before being transported to any other area or out of the state.

2. The numbers or pounds by species of all other fish shall be reported before being transported out of the state.

(f) Seven days before moving the location of operation, floating fish processing vessels must report verbally. in writing, or by telegram to the nearest Department office. The report shall include the present processing location and the exact latitude and longitude of the intended operation.

END OF PROPOSED REGULATIONS Notice is also given that any person interested may present written statements or arguments relevent to the action proposed at the Support Building, Juneau, Alaska, before July 24, 1969.

The Alaska Department of Fish and Game, upon its own motion or at the instance of an interested person. may thereafter adopt the above proposal substantially as set out above without further notice.

In addition to requiring bidders to pay the current fair value for any government property they wanted to buy, the bidders were to specify how much they would spend for capital improvements in the first three years of operations, and what rate reductions they would make.

This sale plan was worked out by the Air Force and the state of Alaska together. Moreover, state officials designated by Governor Miller of Alaska have worked closely with the Air Force throughout the evaluation of offers.

Matanuska has guaranteed to expend \$167,000 on improvements at Healy.

RCA has guaranteed to expend \$27,683,000 on system improvements including:

A new wideband microwave system connecting the major population areas of the state with the planned COMSAT Earth Station at Talkeetna, Alaska, and capable of TV transmission.

RCA has also offered to reduce rates by over 29 per cent, which will save the people of Alaska forty million dollars over the first three years of RCA operation when compared to the present rates. This will include a new one dollar after-midnight rate.

Very worthwhile proposals were received from three other companies; however, only RCA was at or near the top in all three categories: investment in system improvement, rate reductions, and price to the Government.
