Head Start program.

Reporting on the results of the trip, Executive Director Shively stated, "We were able to secure several possibilities of to secure several possibilities of funding, including OEO demonstration monies, Title IV of the Social Security Act and possibly the Head Start Indian Desk. RurAL CAP Member to Do Research to Help **Inform Bush Legislators**

John Shively, Executive Di-rector of RurAL CAP and Chair-man of the Rural Alaska De-velopment Group (RADG) this week signed a contract with Byror Mallott, Director of the Local Affairs agency which will provide a staff member to work on legislative research for the rural legislators. rural legislators.

The staff member was requested by the Rural Caucus which is chaired by Representative Ed Naughton of Kodiak; felt that the rural legislators would be better able to serve the bush areas if they had staff support to research specific bills dealing with problems in the rural areas.

The rural legislators have all made up lists of priority legislative topics. The Rural Alaska tive topics. The Rural Alaska Development Group has also a

number of priority legislative issues which the legislative research person will be dealing with.

The contract also calls for the legislative research person to set up a statewide conference of rural poor people to discuss legislative issues.

The legislative research person

will be arranging for a number of these people to come to Juneau to testify on specific pieces of legislation which af-

pieces of legislation which affect rural Alaska.

Mr. Shively expressed great pleasure at the completion of the contract. He stated, "I feel that if things in rural Alaska are going to improve economically the best by state surgislators will." ly then the state legislators will help the rural legislators in providing legislation to attack the causes of poverty in Alaska.
